## REASONS FOR LOVING LIKE GOD (1 John 4:7-21)

- I. It is a sign of being begotten by God (vs 7-8).
  - A. Loving the brethren shows that we are of God.
    - 1. Love comes from God and we learn to love by the example that God sets for us.
    - 2. This is an example that parents are to emulate for their children the things that they teach them to be.
  - B. An interesting point about the word "agape" is that before the time of Christ, this word was hardly used at all.
    - 1. Very rarely was it used in secular literature, if at all.
    - 2. Even, after it came into use by Christians, this word was rarely used by secular writers.
    - 3. The reason is that sacrificial love is a completely Christian concept.
      - Worldly minded people do not think in terms of sacrificing for others.
      - b. But as God has shown for us, this is the way that we are to think of our brethren and fellow man.
  - C. Only those that are begotten by God love the way that God loves.
    - 1. Love is evidence of the new birth.
    - 2. I used to preach a sermon, Signs of the New Birth.
    - 3. This is one of those signs.
    - 4. We love differently than the world, and like God.
  - D. The one who loves shows that he has intimate knowledge of God, because only one knowing God would know to love like Him.
  - E. Augustine, the 4<sup>th</sup> century theologian made this statement: "A wicked man may have baptism. He may have prophecy. He may receive the sacrament of the body and blood of Christ. All of these things a wicked man may have. But no wicked man can have love."
    - 1. I don't agree in the least with the way he phrased all of that, but the sentiment is true.
    - 2. One who loves shows that they have been genuinely converted.
  - F. There is no way that we know God if we don't love.
  - G. We can't be a child of God if we do not love.
- II. Because of God's bestowal of Christ (vs 9-11).
  - A. God put His love on exhibition by bestowing Christ on the world.
    - 1. John is the only writer to use the phrase "only begotten" about Jesus.
    - 2. It means "one of a kind, ""never to be another like Him."
  - B. The reason for loving God is that God loves us so much that He was willing to sacrifice His only begotten Son.
    - 1. The purpose for it was so that we could live.
    - 2. What could be a greater reason for loving God than the giving of His Son?
  - C. Verse 10 shows that God's love is not based on anything we have done or will do.

- 1. God loved us before we loved Him and this love moved Him to send His Son.
- 2. There is no greater way that God could have shown His love for mankind.
- D. Jesus was sent to be the propitiation for our sins.
  - 1. This word is interesting.
  - 2. It carries the idea of the benefit of reconciliation but also allowing us to be called friends of God.
  - 3. God had to be appeased and Christ did that, but took it a step further by allowing us to have a relationship with God.
- E. Because of that love, we are to love one another.
- F. How could we do any less?

## III. The benefit of God abiding in us (vs 12–16).

- A. We may not have the ability to see God, but we have the ability to allow God to abide in us by loving others.
  - 1. The how of the abiding is found in 1:3, 5.
  - 2. God abides in us as we follow His will
  - 3. Not only that, but we allow our love for God to become mature.
- B. The way that we know He dwells is the same way we know that Jesus abides in us by the Spirit, which is through the word.
- C. John and the other apostles had seen Jesus and gave testimony to the fact that Jesus came into the world to save mankind.
- D. One that will confess Christ will love as he should.
  - 1. This again is dealing with the Gnostic heresy.
  - 2. The Gnostics did not love others because they were too busy pleasing self.
  - 3. They could not make this confession and they could not love as they were commanded.
- E. Christians have knowledge of and belief in the love of God.
  - 1. When we act on that knowledge and belief we can be like God when it comes to love.
  - 2. He will be with us and we will be with Him.

## IV. We receive boldness (vs. 17-18).

- A. When love is matured, we have boldness to face the judgment.
  - 1. This carries the idea of not being found lacking in something if we love the way we should.
  - 2. Love is the foundational element and if we love the way we should, then the rest falls into place.
  - 3. We show our love for God by obeying His commandments and that comes with maturity.
- B. The "he" in verse 17 refers to Jesus.
  - 1. It is Him that we are striving to resemble in this world.
  - 2. By loving all men we imitate Jesus.
  - 3. When we follow His example we have His approval.
- C. We don't have to fear the judgment when we are loving as we should.
  - 1. When we fear now, there is dread and no hope.
  - 2. Love removes that fear.

- D. Verse 19 is important because it shows that Jesus did not die in order to get God to love us, but because He already loved us.
  - 1. Some teach this false doctrine.
  - 2. As one writer said, "After God's love in giving His Son for us, it would be monstrous not to love."

## V. It is the basic element for the love of God (vs 20-21).

- A. You cannot separate love for God and love for man they go hand in hand with each other.
  - 1. One who says he does is a liar.
  - 2. Elsewhere in scripture, John tells us that all liars will lose their souls (Revelation 21:8).
- B. Notice this statement from Woods: "It is a characteristic of love to fix its attention on that which is visible and near; if, therefore, one does not love his brother whom he has seen, it is impossible to love God who one has not seen.
- C. Jesus gave this command several times during His earthly ministry.
